

n the fall of 2003 I attended my first Board of Trustees meeting as the new Saints Principal. The redevelopment of the campus was on the agenda and Fr. John Keller, then President of the school, was discussing the importance of new

The quote speaks to the fundamental importance of architecture in shaping the culture and experiences of organizations, and the idea that the buildings have the

AUGUSTINIAN HERITAGE GOSPEL VALUES EXPLAINED • UNITAS, VERITAS, CARITAS



The word "Augustinian" has many meanings. In the congregational sense, it refers to several unrelated Catholic religious orders. Men and women who belong to these are called Augustinians. The largest group, originally known as the Hermits of St. Augustine or the Austin friars, is now known as the Order of Saint Augustine (OSA) and is the founding sponsor of St. Augustine High School.

But for our purposes, we want to focus on Augustine's understanding that faith is not just belief in truths. More than that, it is a way of seeing, a unique lens through which to view the world that comes from a discerning heart. To Augustine, faith was the way people who love God see the world. Faith has aptly been defined as 'knowledge born of religious love.

The French writer Blaise Pascal, who was very much influenced by St. Augustine, said "the heart has reasons which the mind cannot understand." So for Augustine, the heart ablaze with God's love (caritas) gives direction to the intellectual quest for truth (veritas). First as a teacher, then priest and bishop, Augustine formed communities of Christian friendship dedicated to the common pursuit of truth and love of God, which gave rise to a common sense of purpose and unity (unitas).

These Augustinian themes, our core values, are expressed as the gospel values: Unitas, Veritas, Caritas. (Community, Truth, Love).



UNITAS – As a Catholic community, Saints celebrates the unity between the Creator and creation existing in each person. We commit ourselves to building relationships and structures that enable the flourishing of all peoples and all creation. We place special importance on building community within the School and beyond to the wider circle of the world community through academic coursework that enables students and faculty alike to understand the complexity of the world with regard to the poor, through service learning opportunities and volunteer service.

VERITAS – The pursuit of truth, in the context of Catholic education, includes participating in the ongoing growth and awareness of God's incarnate presence throughout time and history. At Saints, we recognize the importance of the theological and philosophical community and its ongoing respectful dialogue on questions central to the life of the Church

NEW STUDENT CENTER USHERS IN CHANGES IN GRAD CEREMONIES

This year the Baccalaureate Mass and Graduation ceremonies at St. Augustine High School will be different than in the past. - 4. Graduates should assemble in cap and gown at 8:30 a.m. at the bell tower.
- 5. Students need to be in line for the procession to St. Augustine Commons begins at 9:15 a.m., students first, then faculty and followed by administration.
- 6. Doors to St. Augustine Commons open at 8:45 a.m. for handicapped seating and at 9 a.m. on a first-come, first-available basis.
- 7. Proper dress (i.e. white shirt, tie, dress pants, dress shoes and socks) and appropriate grooming regulations are still in order and required of all those participating in the Baccalaureate Mass and Graduation ceremonies.





EIGHT ADVANCE TO AUSTIN EXAMS

Noah Emanuel DiNapoli, Gian Franco Ferrer, Michael Emerson Ingraham, Ryan Thomas Kenney, Juan Carlos Meave-Ojeda, Ricardo Miguel Soto, Trevor Charles South, and Joseph Paul Tanaka were invited by the school to sit for this year's Austin Exams.

The "Austins" are rigorous oral examinations in English, mathematics, religion, science, social studies, and visual and performing arts. The exam also assesses the participants' understanding of the Integral Student Outcomes.

Seniors with the highest weighted academic cumulative grade point average at the conclusion of the seventh semester (P.E. excluded) are automatically invited to sit for the Austins. The remaining students, normally five, are selected by the Academic Council from the top 10% of the graduating class.

Faculty chairpersons of the academic departments recommend specific academic distinctions for participants. The administration ratifies these recommendations.

These academic distinctions include: Austin Scholar Summa Cum Laude (with highest praise) Austin Scholar Magna Cum Laude (with great praise) Austin Scholar Cum Laude (with praise).

Entry fee for the four-person scramble include: greens fees and Shared Cart, Post Tournament Dinner and Auction, hosted drinks, a Saints pullover and raffle ticket. Last year's tournament sold out a couple weeks ahead of the registration deadline so be sure to sign up early while taking advantage of this year's early registration giveaway.

The annual golf tournament is the Alumni Association's main source of funding in support of Saints with over \$400,000 being raised to date. Proceeds from the event each year support traditional alumni efforts such as hosting the parochial football and basketball tournaments, the 50th year graduate reception, along with the schools writing and poetry contests and long range efforts such as the association's support of the school's capital campaigns and Alumni Endowed scholarship fund.

A highlight of this year's event will be the class competition for the largest gift awarded to the Alumni Endowed Scholarship Fund. This fund provides tuition aid for sons and grandsons of former Saintsmen. The challenge has been thrown down by the class of 1968 who graciously gifted last year's tournament with a \$5,800 donation from more nearly 30 class members. Class specific donations will be tallied up through the day of the tournament. Which class will step up this year and become the new leader in the clubhouse? The largest class gift this year will receive a class naming opportunity alongside the class of '68 featured within the forthcoming on campus performing arts center. The performing arts center will see an adaptive reuse of historic Dougherty gymnasium into an on-campus theater and music studio as Phase III of the campus master plan.

JUST HOW GOOD IS SAINTS PLAYOFF BOUND VARSITY BASKETBALL TEAM? Continued from page 1

"The 2016-17 Saints team is very, very good. Maybe the best, from what I've seen, at least at this point in the season," says veteran sports scribe Rick Smith.

Smith, who covered prep sports professionally and is the respected dean of prep sports history in this town, points out the Saintsmen are also ranked 11th in the state by Cal-Hi Sports.

Being undefeated in San Diego County, the Saintsmen finished No. 1 in the Union-Tribune regular season poll and became the CIF's San Diego Section No. 1 in the top (open) division.

Smith noted "the first playoff game vs. La Costa Canyon (late last month) was perhaps the last game ever at Saints Dougherty Gym. He told readers of his respected sports blog (www.partletonsports.com) "That Saints figures to defeat the Mavericks in the first round," but he cautioned "in the playoffs anything can happen."

Win or lose, the Saints basketball program is among the best in the county with "Mike Haupt being among the best coaches in the area," says Union-Tribune prep reporter John Maffei, who covered varsity basketball this season. More on Coach Haupt later in this story.

What made Saints Varsity a winner this season, says Maffei, is having "a star, go-toplayer in Taeshon Cherry and a great cast around him. Jack Peterson, Tariq Thompson, Otto Taylor, JT Cox and Josue Lara are all really good role players."

Saints watchers had to be pleased with the emergence of the Freshman players who earned playing time on the Varsity roster.

Maffei added, "The freshmen class could be special. Chibazu Agbo is very good and will only get bigger and better. Kimo Ferrari did a really nice job filling in when Otto Taylor was hurt. Luke Haupt is getting more comfortable every game."

Given the Saints' three losses were to teams still alive in the playoffs — Los Angeles Fairfax (25-3); twice to Santa Ana Mater Dei (28-1) and the other loss was to Northridge Heritage (20-8), the team's chances are good to win in the San Diego playoffs.

UT's John Maffei predicts "I think a Saints-Torrey Pines CIF San Diego final will be a special, special game."

When asked if the current Saints team

could win the state title, Maffei said, "It all depends on where they're placed in the SoCal playoffs. I don't think the Saints, or any San Diego team, can win a State-wide Open Division title against Chino Hills, Santa Ana Mater Dei or Sierra Canyon. Can Saints win a Division I title? Yes."

Smith agreed, "If the Saints win locally I think they'd have an even chance in the regional-state Division 1. I don't think they could win in the regional-state Open division. Those highly-recruited Southern Section NBAstyle squads have vastly a larger talent pool to pick from, globally in Santa Ana Mater Dei's case."

Let's do some pie-in-the-sky gymnastics and ask if Saints advances to the State finals and wins. Will that win make them the school's best ever team?

Rick Smith ventured forth: "I think this

playoffs," said Smith.

But as a recognized prep sports historian Smith points out everything is relative. "The 1954-55 team led by John Cunningham was pretty good, reaching the Southern Cal quarterfinals. Tom Shaules' team was fun to watch but, at 20-6, did not make the playoffs in '57-58. The Andre Hardy Saints team that preceded Kell's club should have won the state title but was beaten by Santa Cruz."

But as we said at the beginning, this article was put together before the playoffs started. And again win or lose, what the Saints have accomplished before the playoffs reflects on the quality of the school; its coach and coaching staff; basketball program, its loyal alums and rabid fanbase.

Speaking of coaching, Rich Smith adds, coach Mike Haupt is a true "basketball guy. He was a CIF basketball player of the year



team is better than the team Trey Kell led to the state championship in his junior year, when Kell made three free throws in the last second to forge an overtime against Sacred Heart of San Francisco. I think the 2016-17 squad has played a more demanding schedule."

"Remember the Kell-led team played in Division 3 in the regional and State playoffs. This team, if it wins the San Diego Section Open Division, could be in Division 1 or the Open Division in the regional and state at Mira Mesa High, and played at USD. As the school's admission's director, Haupt is probably is aware of the background of every youngster who is admitted to Saints and has future basketball players on his radar from the time they pick up a ball in the grammar schools."

Concludes Mr. James Horne, Saints Principal, "Mike Haupt is a master of getting players to play beyond themselves. He is a champion of drawing the best effort from each of his players, and it shows."

and Br. Dick Hardick, OSA, '57 had all graduated from Saints. Only Fr. Greg Heidenblut, OSA, was not a graduate of the school.

That Augustinian community was asked to begin the capital campaign with a \$1 million pledge. Despite the fact that historically the Augustinians had not committed to these types of projects, the Members of the Corporation, after much discussion and reflection, made the decision to support this initiative. It was their belief that the campaign would be successful only with their visible leadership of a pledge. Their action provided the stimulus and inspiration for the foundations, alumni and alumni and current parents to support this critical effort, ultimately helping achieve the funding goals established by the Feasibility Study.

With their gift, the Augustinians were given the honor of naming this spectacular addition to the Saints campus. While Villanova and Mendel Halls were built specifically to educate the intellect, the focus of the St. Augustine Commons will be to educate the heart and become a place where community is formed. The building has numerous areas available for people to meet, learn, compete, hang-out, celebrate, eat and gather for activities not yet envisioned.

It was clear from the outset this structure would bear Augustine's name in some form given that Christian friendship and unity are the heart of his fifth century contemplations of Christian community. Initially it was called the *St. Augustine Center*. However this name lacked the feel of a place where community would be formed. Most fittingly, Fr. John Keller, OSA '55 suggested the word *Commons* replace Center.

In exploring the historical context of the word Commons, it soon became clear this word better represented Saints core value of *unitas*. The word was originally used in medieval England to identify land held in common and jointly used with others. The St. Augustine Commons is to be held in common, not owned privately. It is to be accessible to all members of the community as a shared resource in which each member of the school community -- students, faculty, alumni and parents -- have an equal interest and all are welcomed. Above all, the *St. Augustine Commons* is a place where Saintsmen will form lasting friendships and brotherhood for a lifetime.

In this spirit, the Dan Vera Foyer, with a fireplace as the focus is the welcoming point into the Commons. It is easy to envision boys sitting around the hearth talking, reading, studying, eating just being with one another.

In a matter of weeks, life at Saints will move into this magnificent addition that began as a dream Fr. John Sanders, OSA '66 had for Saints during his principalship in the 1990's.

The St. Augustine Commons will welcome thousands of boys who will graduate as young men ready to change the world!


