are well into their eighties. I'm one of their five children. One of the most pressing issues facing our family this year is the progressive memory loss my mother has been experiencing for the past several years. This year has been one where her declining cognitive abilities have accelerated. She has difficulty recognizing people she does not see regularly. She has lost her driving privileges. She often does not recall a question she asked five minutes earlier, and asks again. She is sometimes disoriented as to where she is, and what time of the day it is. This is something we have all read about, but experiencing it has been another story...and this is where I am most grateful this year.

Recognizing the increasing stress that our father was experiencing as mom's primary caregiver, one of my sisters suggested the five of us siblings sit down for a conference call last spring. (We live in four different cities) The call was a time for each of us to talk about our concerns... leading we hoped into strategizing about how we might make a positive contribution to the new reality of our parents' situation. That first call was one filled with grace for each of us...and emerging from it we have developed a program to be sure our parents are in touch with at least one of us on a daily basis, to be sure their needs are being met, to be confident that their care and well-being is being supervised. We have set up a shared calendar to help us coordinate with each other. We have regularly scheduled follow-up conference calls.

This coming together around the care of our parents has had unintended consequences for each of us. One of these surprises is that my brother, who has viewed the Church with much suspicion since his adolescence is now attending Mass every Sunday with mom...and actually enjoying it! The list goes on, but suffice it to say we are all feeling much more connected to each other, and we are all using our particular gifts to contribute to caring for our parents. I've never felt prouder to be a member of my family.



So I've experienced something that might be viewed as burdensome and unfair being transformed into an opportunity to respond positively to Jesus' call to 'Follow me'. I've been given the grace to reframe this reality and to calibrate my response appropriately. I've grown closer to both my parents and my siblings. I am profoundly grateful for being able to experience God's grace present in this situation that many might experience with hopelessness, or anger, or despair. This Thanksgiving I invite us all to dig a little deeper, to explore a challenge or burden in our lives and invite God into the conversation about how this might best be navigated. You may very well encounter something to be truly thankful for.

RUN, FIGHT, HIDE

SAINTS GRAD. A SAN DIEGO POLICE OFFICER. IS BEING CALLED A LAS VEGAS LIFESAVER.



Tom McGrath, a 2009 grad of St. Augustine High, is being called a hero for his life saving actions as an off-duty San Diego police officer. McGrath and his wife Nicole were attending the ill-faced concert that was raked by sniper fire killing 58. She credits her husband with saving her life and the lives of many others.

o one wants to revisit a horror, but we feel it is important to report how one Saints Alum Tom McGrath is being called a hero by many for his lifesaving actions at the Las Vegas sniper attack, which killed 58 persons last month.

McGrath, a 2009 grad, who was attending ill-fated Las Vegas concert is a patrolman with the San Diego Police Department. His wife Nicole said he shielded her from the spray of bullets that whistled around them.

She went on to say, once they reached safety they became separated. Officer McGrath was off-duty but when he came across wounded individuals he lingered at the venue and applied first aid measures to many victims.

After the shooting, he was reunited with his wife and many who witnessed McGrath's actions pointed him out to the media. The following is a phone interview by a Las Vegas TV station. It is in McGrath's own words. At one point in the interview, he said Police are trained to run for cover and hide until they can assess the danger and then stand and fight.

In his short police career this is the second lifesaving incident McGrath has been involved in. Two years ago, he and another officer are credited with applying CPR to save a lifeless baby girl.

Saints Athletic Director Mr. Michael Stephenson remembers Tom McGrath as a fine cross country runner and a model of great work ethic. "I was not surprised to hear Tommy took on the role of caring for others in this unfortunate crisis," said Mr. Stephenson.

ike Tompkins, now a new member of Saints Faculty, attended Kearny High and San Diego State, where he studied Spanish, telecommunications and film. In 1996, he found an intriguing way to put his skills to use. His new office was mere steps away from Tony Gwynn's locker.

On Sunday, the Padres played their 2017 home finale. Their longtime video coordinator concluded a 22-season run in his "dream job." "I just always appreciated how they were with me," Tompkins said. "I'm not a baseball player, I'm the video guy. And for all the time I've been here, starting with Tony Gwynn and Trevor Hoffman and Mark Sweeney, those guys all made me feel like I was part of the team. Anyone I came in contact with, Iwasa part of the team. I just had a different job."

Tompkins, 46, is transitioning to a new career, teaching full-time at St. Augustine High. Four weeks ago, he began leading classes in Spanish, digital photography and comparative religion. Instead of helping baseball players prepare for games, he'll be imparting lessons to teenagers.


If your senior still son needs to take an SAT or ACT again, the last chance is during December. The SAT is December 2 and the ACT is December 9. The registration deadlines are soon so register right away if you still need one of these tests.

We are currently meeting with junior and sophomore students through the end of this semester to check in with them, see how they are doing academically and otherwise, encourage them to be involved and keep up with their service hour requirement, and to recommend what courses to take next year (i.e their 4-year plan). Mr. Bronson has been systematically meeting with the freshmen to check on their adjustment to Saints and to encourage and recommend activities they might get involved in.

For Junior students, we recommend that they take their SAT and ACT exams during the Spring Semester. We will offer Practice SAT and ACT tests through Princeton Review during the first and second Saturdays in January. There will also be test prep classes on campus during February and March. Further specific information on these practice tests and prep classes will be coming soon.

The Freshman Parent College Night will be Tuesday, November 14 and the Junior Parent College Night will be held on Wednesday, January 31 (save the date!) We look forward to working with parents as we assist you son with his academics, career and college search.

Saints being a noted institution of higher learning will produce inquiring minds who might ask how did such a turkey event ever begin on campus.

After digging into school archives, it became plain to see the history behind this annual November rite is a wheelbarrow of lore though most of its anecdotal.

Father Harry Neely ('45) believes the run took place when he was a student during the World War II years, but he hasn't found proof among his high school yearbooks. Still, it's difficult to find an alumnus who doesn't recall a running of the student turkeys.

The jaunt through the neighborhood and twice around the Saints track typically takes place the Tuesday before Thanksgiving and more than once it provided a bonanza for the late great Cross Country Coach Jerry Downey.

Ten minutes from start to finish is a


decent time for a fit athlete to cover the route and Nathan Stender ('02) was. He was an undiscovered football player before running the Turkey Trot. After running the Turkey Trot, Saints Hall of Famer Downey informed Stender he had now been discovered and he was really a 'runner'. The same proved true for Ryan Moorcroft ('00) who ran the course so fast people thought he cheated. When everybody learned his performance included no short cuts he received a heartfelt apology, a handshake and promise of fame as a CIF track star.

Turkey Trot popularity waned a bit by the early 1990s until Tony Sabatino (H'01), Associate Principal at the time and then ASB Moderator John O'Beirne ('84) conversed and breathed new life into it. Mr. Sabatino offered students a chance to have one detention removed from a student's record it they could beat him to the finish line. Plenty, though certainly not all, students succeeded.

Years later when Mr. O'Beirne became Assistant Principal he extended the same offer. Few, though by far not all students, are able to best John O'Beirne in his prime.

Nowadays hundreds of students jockey for a key place at the front of the starting line, but that's not because they expect to win but rather in hopes of a prominent place in a possible yearbook photo. As for stamina, if there are any doubts about what separates the men from the boys those doubts are answered before anybody reaches the top of Juniper hill. A commemorative t-shirt goes to entrants who pay the nominal entrance fee. A runner who takes first place usually wins a frozen tom.

Decades ago first, second and third place could bring the winners a live turkey, a spring chicken and a dead duck, respectively.

PADRES VIDEO DIRECTOR

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Mike Tompkins

A pull stronger than a team's told him it was time to make a change.

"Over the last five to six seasons, I started thinking, 'I need to figure out away to be home more,' "said Tompkins, the father of Michael, 12, and Anthony, 11. "It was always kind of on my radar. I love what I do, and when the season ended I knew I had time to be with my kids, but as I got older and as they were getting older, I was like, 'You've got to figure something out.' "It was a tough decision because I've been here so long, but I feel like it's the right decision for my family. I have nothing but love for the Padres. I grew up loving the Padres as a kid."

Tompkins was 25 when he joined the team as an assistant to Mike Howder, who helped Gwynn pioneer the use of film study in baseball. The first day on the job, Tompkins recalled, was "nerve-wracking." He felt more at ease after Tim Flannery, then the Padres' third base coach, introduced himself and cracked a joke.


In time, Tompkins, an amateur impressionist, became known for his own ability to inject levity into the clubhouse. Simultaneously, he established himself as an integral part of the players' daily routines. Tompkins went from assistant to the

top job in 2001. The technology went from primitive to cutting-edge, with Tompkins overseeing all aspects of the team's video production, from scouting videos to archives of player footage. He charted every pitch of every game, supplying information critical for devising game plans. "Anything we could ever want, he'd make it available," Padres pitcher Clayton Richard said. "And that's a huge help throughout the season." During the offseasons, Tompkins pursued another passion while making extra cash as a substitute teacher. Eventually, he developed an idea. If a full-time opening arose at St. Augustine, he would be interested.

Early this season, Tompkins received a phone call from the school. He talked things over with his wife before making his decision in June. When school started last month, Tompkins began pulling double duty, forgoing the Padres' final few road trips. Baseball operations coordinators Patrick Coghlan and David Longley filled in for him.

"It was different," Richard said. "He's a great, positive influence around the clubhouse. He always brought energy every day, and that's a tough thing to do in baseball. He's a professional. He loves his family, and I think this decision is for his family. We're happy that he's doing that for his family, and we're going to miss him a ton." The Padres will have an opening to fill this winter. Tompkins will continue working through the first week of June. "I feel like it's something new in my life," he said, "so I'm excited about trying to be a good teacher."

The last 22 seasons, of course, will stay with him. "When the players retire, they say they miss the clubhouse and the plane trips," Tompkins said. "The grind is the grind, you just deal with it, but everyone always misses the camaraderie. I think that's what I'll miss, like everybody else."

Q&A WITH HEAD COACH BRENDAN JOHNSTON

Question: How do you feel about the 2018 season coming in as Open Division defending Champs?

Answer: I am extremely proud of what our boys accomplished last year. Winning the Open Division Championship

is what every high school player hopes to achieve. Our players know how hard we had to work and the importance of performing in big moments. The players have confidence knowing that they are capable of winning. The joy and satisfaction of winning makes us want to achieve it every year. However, we also know that teams are going to look forward to the opportunity to beat us. We have to use that as motivation to sharpen our focus and resolve this year.

Q: What student athletes will lead this year's squad?

A: Senior and four year letterman Jesus
Delgadillo brings valuable experience and
leadership to this year's squad. He has been
part of two CIF titles in his first three years in
our program. Jesus knows what it takes to
win. He has the ability to have a profound

Q: Although it is early yet, what does the Coaching staff see as the strength of this year's team?


