The cross country team has managed to bring home the hardware once again, outperforming even their previous successful season. Managing to go a perfect 12-0 in league, they were able to become back-to-back Eastern League champs. As a team the Saintsmen were dominant, taking five of the top nine spots at Eastern League finals.

The season was filled with many individual accomplishments as well, with three Saints runners taking home personal accolades. Owen Marcinkowski was able to beat out the competition in the final race of the season and take home Freshman of the Year. Owen Arnaundy was dominant all season, achieving Junior of the Year. Lastly, Thomas Banzhof took home Senior of the Year, coming out on top of any opposition.

Cross country was able to perform at CIF as well, taking 5th place in Division III despite steep competition. With many returning runners for next season, the future looks bright.

Coming off a successful season last year, beach volleyball returned looking like a dominant force. The Saints certainly showed this dominance, going

undefeated in league. After last year's division two triumph, the Saintsmen were moved up to Open Division facing more challenging competition. Despite the team's success, they were shown an early exit. Nonetheless, the future of beach volleyball looks bright as many players will be returning next year hoping to lead the team to victory.

Saints football surpassed all expectations this year, despite a slower start to the season. In league play, Saints destroyed the opposition, falling short only to Lincoln, securing a second place spot and finishing league 3-1. To

add on to their many accomplishments this year, Saints finished ahead of the Dons, beating them on their home turf 27-21 in a back-and-forth Holy Bowl game win, the first since 2017.

Coming in as the 5th seed in CIF play, Saints clinched a first round home game, where they faced Mira Mesa, and breezed by them with little issue. Against 4th seed La Costa Canyon, the Saints put up an encouraging road win. Coming back home for a semifinal game against Madison, a close rain game that came down to a one point overtime win, the Saints

were able to advance to the Division I finals against 2nd seed Mission Hills.

Mission Hills was looking to be a tough opponent taking down every other team that had stood in their way up to that point. Saints managed to weather the storm, prevailing in a hardfought 13-0 victory. The Saints were able to shut down Mission Hills on offense, not allowing any good looks. Meanwhile, the Saints' offense took advantage of gaps and mistakes in

Scholarship Announced in Cudal's Honor

Saint Augustine High School prides itself on being a diverse community, home to people of various cultural and socio-economic backgrounds. In order to create such an environment, however, it is necessary to offer some aid to underserved students.

Saints provides financial aid through various programs, the newest of which

being the Tom Cudal 1972 Scholarship.

The scholarship was created by Anthon. Wagner '94 who first met Mr. Cudal during the Saints application process. At the time, Mr. Cudal was an Assistant Principal, placing him in charge of deciding whom to admit and whom not to admit.

When the two met, Mr. Wagner was an eighth grader at St. Therese who struggled with learning disabilities that barely allowed him to read and write. During his admission interview, Mr. Wagner

expressed his determination to work diligently in order to earn the opportunity of attending the school. Mr. Cudal decided to give Mr. Wagner a chance.

"He gave me that opportunity when a whole lot of other people in academics at the time were saying no," Mr. Wagner said.

Mr. Wagner fought to maintain his status as a Saintsman, working as a janitor after school for all four years and as a pager over the summers to pay for his education.

"[Mr. Wagner] did everything he could just to be here," Mr. Cudal remarked.

During his time at Saints, Mr. Wagner persevered and excelled, eventually graduating Cum Laude with a 4.0 GPA. He credits all of his later successes in life to Saints and to Mr. Cudal.

"I attribute all of that to a man of academic stature 35 years ago that believed in me before I could prove it to everybody else. He saw something in me and I am eternally grateful for that," Mr. Wagner said.

In a demonstration of his gratitude for the opportunity Mr. Cudal gave him, Mr. Wagner thought there to be "no better way to honor a man" than to set up the Tom Cudal 1972 Scholarship in his name.

Mr. Wagner emphasized the importance of timing in the scholarship's foundation, explaining that he wanted to honor Mr. Cudal while he was still teaching at Saints. Mr. Wagner hoped the scholarship would demonstrate both his own gratitude and the gratitude of thousands of other Saintsmen whom he has helped over the years.

Saints has been working on raising money for Mr. Cudal's scholarship over the past few weeks, beginning at a fundraising event hosted by Mr. Wagner. The school also held a livestream event on Giving Tuesday to support the endowment with an emphasis on the Tom Cudal Scholarship.

Mr. Chris Cashman, Director of Social Media and Alumni Relations worked tirelessly to put on the event which he said raised about \$260,000 in total.

According to Mr. Hearn, President of Saint Augustine High School, the Giving Tuesday event raised about \$40,000 for Mr. Cudal's Scholarship. Hearn hopes the fund will continue to grow as knowledge of its foundation spreads to all of the past and present Saintsmen who got to know and love Mr. Cudal.

Coach Douglas: Always Making the Cut

Every Saintsman is familiar with Coach Maurice Douglas, whose commanding presence and successful coaching have always been inspiring. Always a pleasure to be around, he is quick to offer helpful guidance from his meaningful life experiences.

Since Coach “Mo” has many unknown talents and trades, The Augustinian thought it fitting to highlight his wisdom and experiences in this issue.

This interview has been edited for brevity and clarity.

The Augustinian: Please, tell us a bit about your background.

Coach Douglas: I graduated at San Diego High School. Richard Sanchez, who was a coach here for about nine years, was my coach and mentor at San Diego High School. When I was 15 years old, I was actually going to quit school, and I was just going to work full time. He was my angel and brought me into his home, and I lived with him for two years my Junior and Senior year, and then full circle started coaching here with him in 2015. I was supposed to go to college at UCLA, I had a scholarship for UCLA, but I didn’t get a chance to go because I started dancing, and dancing was my passion.

TA: What inspired you to dance, and how did you get started?

Douglas: I was really shy so I danced a lot at home. The way I got into that was I tried out for this show on MTV called *Sisqó’s Shakedown*, and it was a little summer gig while I was here in 1999. So I tried out for this show in 1999 and I got second place. So from that show I got approached by this lady who represented a bunch of women from San Diego to dance on this show called *Soul Train*. *Soul Train* is this show that has been around for a long time, since like the ‘70s, ‘80s, so I got onto this show and from this show that branched off into other different things like modeling and acting, while I continued to dance too. So I met a bunch of dif-



ferent artists and was able to branch off of that which started my dancing career. So I danced for 15 years professionally. When I was younger I used to watch this show *Soul Train* so a lot of the things in my life has happened by the grace of God and has kind of fell in my lap, you know with Coach Sanchez helping me out and actually leading me in the right direction that made me able to do the dancing and all the stuff that I wanted to do. While I was doing my dance I continued my college education. I went over to Mesa for two years, and from Mesa went over to

San Jacinto in Texas for two years, and I graduated from there.

TA: Have you been in any productions or ads we might recognize or know of?

Douglas: I did modeling and acting along with the dance for about 15 years as well. I had a feature part in the movie *You Got Served*, a dancing movie, and then also I was in *First Daughter* with Katie Holmes where I had a speaking role. I was the football team captain which is something I was already used to, so it was pretty easy to do. I’ve done about ten movies

and ten music videos, some of which were Mac 10, Missy Elliott, Tush, and Ghostface Killah.

I did some modeling too for Wilhelmina, a big time agency in LA and New York. They got me a bunch of different jobs where I worked with P Diddy. His clothing line was Sean John at the time, and I sold that. I also did Sean John, Fruit of the Loom, a couple of commercials for Coca Cola, Pepsi, among others. I’ve lived a long life – I’m 43 and I still continue to do stuff.

TA: You also mentioned football was familiar to you. What has your experience with football been?

Douglas: I wasn’t that good at football, but I was very passionate about perfecting my craft which was catching the ball. I took a break from football to do my dance career because I was very passionate about that and then I came back to it. I played indoor arena for San Diego Shockwave, LA Avengers for two years, professionally and then from there I was supposed to try out for the Seattle Seahawks but I got into a car accident the weekend before my tryout, so that hurt my chances.

In 2013-2014, I started coaching track and field and football at University City, so I got back into it. My freshman team played Saints and we beat them 50-0. (I hate to say that, but it happened, you know?) Richard Sanchez walks out of the office and sees me down the way; he is looking at the scoreboard and he was, like, what the heck, who is this whooping on my team, you know? And he runs down and he goes “Douglas?” He runs down, sprints down, and picks me up, hugs me; he says, “Dude I haven’t seen you for 15 years, how are you doing?” and I told him I’ve been doing my thing and now I’m coaching, and I didn’t know that he was here.

I said to him I’d love to come and chop it up with him, and he asked me to come to his office the following day to talk to me. I came in dressed up, ready to go, and he had Coach Pomatto and Coach Kremer in the office with him for an interview.

Team Feature: Basketball Shoots for Greatness

Welcome to The Augustinian's Team Feature article! This month's sport is Basketball. The Saints Basketball team has made the Saints community proud with multiple CIF championships wins, and this year, they will hope to prove themselves again. The Saints Basketball team is led by head coach Mike Haupt.

In the past, the team has dominated against all other San Diego teams. They have been undefeated against San Diego teams since December 2021. Last year, Saints made an impressive run through the season, going undefeated in both the regular season and playoffs. They made it all the way to the CIF championships, where they beat Montgomery High School, giving them their CIF win for the fourth Open Division title in five trips to the finals.

The team ended up being the #1 team in San Diego and #7 overall in the state. They won the Western League again for the 16th time in a row in the school’s history. Their total record was 28-5.

The returning players this season include senior Ian de la Rosa, and senior Lolo Rudolph, who is a signee with Cal State University Fullerton. Both Ian and Lolo were all-CIF performers last year. Other notable players are sophomore

Jaden Bailes and Junior Manny Cortez. A good amount of last years’ varsity players have graduated, however despite the loss of players Saints is continuing to dominate this season. This can be seen in their first game against Scripps Ranch, where they won in a landslide ending the game 87-49, with sophomore Jaiden Bailes being named player of the game.

As of the writing of this article, Saints is 5-0 showing very big promise to the rest of the year. If this team can continue to work together as they have been, we are destined for a 3-peat league San Diego CIF win, showing that the Saints are the best in town.

The team also played two tournaments last year. These included the Tarkanian Classic in Las Vegas and the Torrey Pines Tournament. They were able to go to the championship of the Torrey Pines Tournament, but they lost to the Cadets. They will also be playing in these tournaments later this season.

Saints has also been invited to two upcoming showcase events in Los Angeles. These include the Coastal Catholic Classic on January 6 at the Crypto.com arena against Loyola of Los Angeles, and the Nike Extravaganza on January 27 at Mater Dei Santa Ana against JSerra Catholic High School from Orange County.

Saints not only has a varsity team, but also a junior varsity and freshman

I have a riddle for you: when is Advent not Advent? Answer: when it's already Christmas!

It can be difficult to celebrate Christmas in a Christian—and especially Catholic—spirit now that Christmas has become so secularized. While this time of Advent is supposed to be a time of *preparation* for Christmas, the world *already* screams "Merry Christmas!", the halls are decked, carols are sung, parties are thrown, and Christmas trees are up right after Halloween.

Thus, viewed from a Catholic standpoint, Christmas "out there" is celebrated *backwards*: Instead of Christmas *beginning* on December 25th, it *culminates* on the 25th; while the Christmas season is supposed to end on January 6th (and technically the Sunday after it) you'd be lucky to hear a single Christmas carol after New Year's Eve, even in Catholic homes.

Most of us are familiar with the twelve days of Christmas, mostly through the song, but too many of us don't know what the twelve days refer to, or even when they begin. In recent years Jimmy Fallon has been doing a Twelve Days of Christmas Sweaters countdown on the Tonight Show, where each day a different holiday sweater was featured until Christmas. Now, I realize the Christmas that Fallon is celebrating is not religious in nature, but still, it is a reflection of the popular perception—even among Catholics—that the Twelfth Day of Christmas is Christmas Day itself, the 25th. In fact,

it is the opposite: December 25th is the *first* day of Christmas!

Secular Christmas, of course, begins right after Thanksgiving, and we can thank commercialism for that. If you want shoppers to spend more money at your mall, remind them that Christmas is around the corner. With music! With lights! With trees! Or better still, why wait? Christmas is **ALREADY** here!

Unfortunately, for those of us trying to keep Christ in Christmas, it's a strong current to swim against. After all, we love Christmas. It is, as the song says, "the most wonderful time of the year." We can't wait to bust out the music and put up the tree, to gaze at Christmas lights and listen to carolers. And let's not forget the presents! Advent? Yeah, that's cute, but let's just skip it and get to the good stuff...

And yet as Catholics, we should wait. We must wait. That is the very purpose of the Advent season — we await the arrival (*adventus* in Latin) of the Savior incarnate. It is a time of prayer, reflection, and in some traditions, even penance.

But first, I would like to acknowledge that in today's world, celebrating the Christmas spirit strictly according to the liturgical calendar would be very difficult, impractical even. For example, every year, the Saints faculty attend a Christmas party which is always during Advent — and yes, we call it a Christmas party; Still, I always attend and am very happy to be there. After all, when else could the party take place? During Christmas break? Impractical — lots of teachers would be out of town. After New Year's? Possibly, but the teachers who travel for Intercession would be left

out. It simply seems more feasible to hold it before the 25th.

I also visit the nativity scenes at December Nights at Balboa Park and listen to Christmas carols performed by choirs at the Organ Pavilion. Should I boycott them all because it's not officially Christmas?

Still, we should make an effort to make Christmas as Christian and as timely as possible, and so I'd like to offer some suggestions to make it easier to co-exist in the City of God and the City of Man.

Don't skip Advent — make it matter. Pray more. Reflect on God's love. Read a spiritual book. Perform acts of mercy upon the needy. Go to confession.

Don't play religious Christmas carols until Christmas. Stick to winter songs or secular "Christmas" songs. "Winter Wonderland," "Jingle Bells," or even Santa Claus songs would do. Remember: celebrating Christmas during Advent is like celebrating Easter during Lent.

Attend the Christmas parties, but maintain an attitude of Christmas anticipation instead of Christmas-is-here.

Celebrate Christmas beyond Christmas day itself, as the season celebrates more than just Christ's birth. "Happy Holidays" is actually a profoundly Christian greeting, as it refers to the multiple holy days (where do you think the word "holiday" comes from?) celebrated during this time: Christmas Day, the Solemnity of Mary the Mother of God (January 1st), and Epiphany (January 6th), among others. In some countries, the Christmas season extends to February 2nd!

Ah, the tree. This is a tough one. In

generations past (and in my family), the tree was erected on December 24th! And while that would be ideal, making such a change might be too abrupt for most. But there are some things we can do to temper our impatience as we anticipate the second most important holy day on the Church calendar. And whatever you do, don't take down the tree until at least the feast of Epiphany! Those who are taking it down on the 26th are doing it when Christmas has only but started! And keep that Christmas music going for about a week after New Year's!

So as we groan that some celebrate Christmas too early, we can be part of the solution too, at least in our homes and in our hearts.

I wish you all a Merry Christmas—in advance—and may this current prayerful season of Advent prepare us for the joyous feast of His Nativity—and beyond.

Mr. Cashman reminded that anything families give, from the smallest of donations to the largest, will help people for years to come.

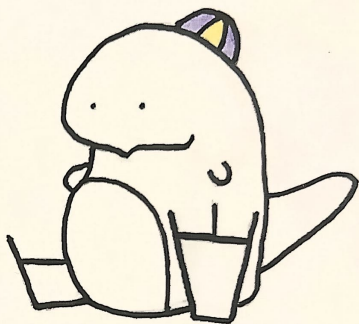
“As long as the school is operating, that gift will go on forever,” Cashman said.

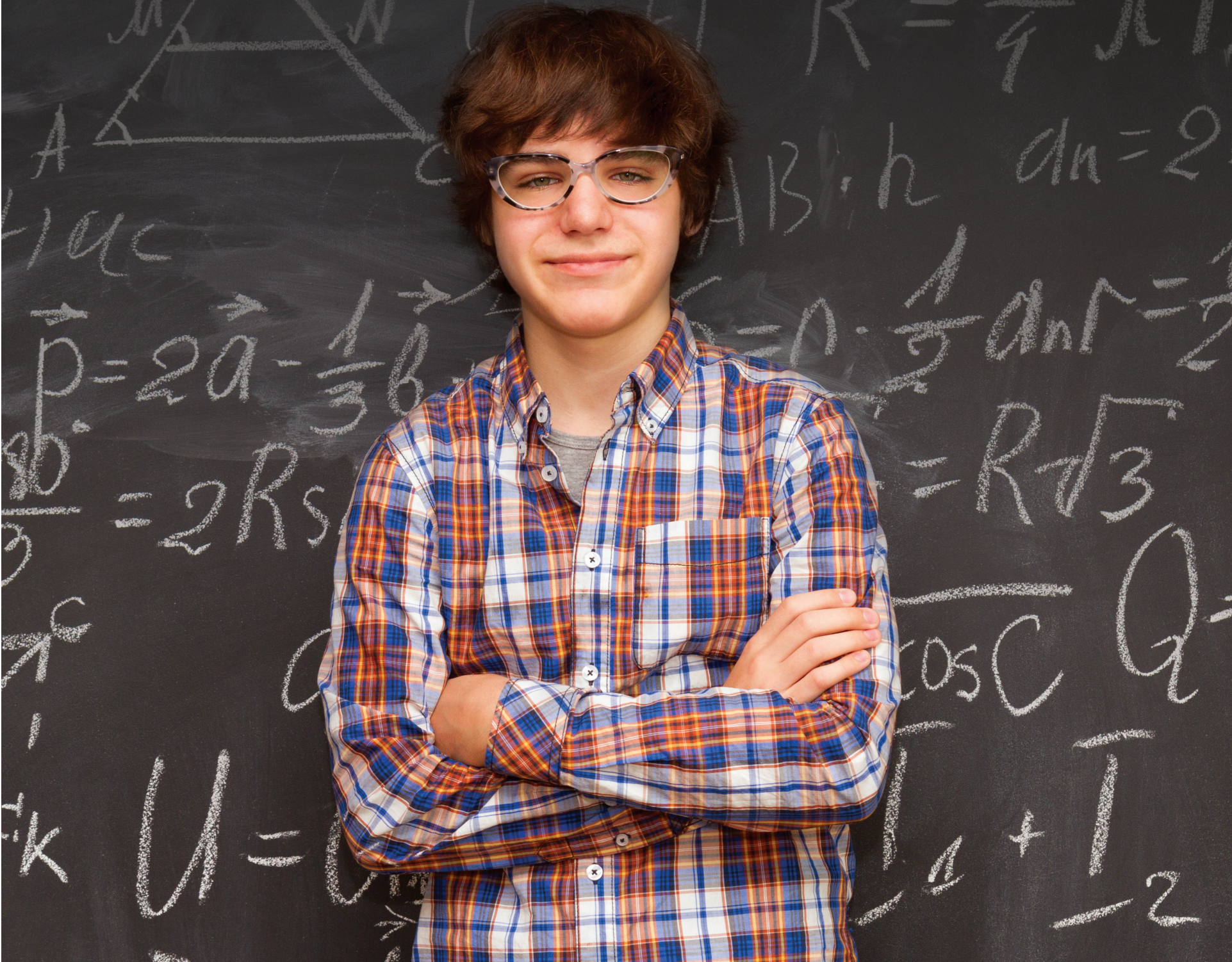
The scholarship’s foundation will further cement Mr. Cudal into the history of St. Augustine High School and aid the next generation of Saintsmen in their academic journeys.
