- 6.\*\*Simplified Tax Process:\*\* Most students won't need tax forms. A streamlined process imports federal tax info directly from the IRS.

# DEFERRED OR WAITLISTED? HOW TO WRITE A GREAT LETTER OF CONTINUED INTEREST

This is an article for students who pick

themselves back up when they fall down. We all fall down. What matters is if we get up again. When it comes to college admissions, here's how to get back on your feet **Step 1: Emotions are ok** Some basics: You are a human. Humans have emotions. While we led with the "pick yourself up" part, and while you're probably there already if you're reading this, and while the "picking yourself up" part *is* indeed very important, still: you can cry. You can shout. You can sulk. Give yourself permission to have emotions — even if those emotions lead you to waste some time.

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#### **EARLY DECISION 2 - STILL AN OPTION**

Notifications for Early Decision (ED), Restricted Early Decision (RED), and Single Choice Early Action (SCEA) were delivered in December. This year, as in previous years, there will be many more tears than fist-bumps. Here are some of the staggeringly competitive numbers of the ED applicant pool from Princeton Review's Best 389 College & Universities – 2024 edition:

- Brown University 6,146 applied, 15 percent accepted;
- Columbia University 6,299 applied, 12 percent accepted;
- Duke University 4,070 applied, 22 percent accepted;
- Vanderbilt University 5,044 applied, 18 percent accepted.

Students who were rejected or deferred will find themselves in phase two of their application process.

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#### Step 2: Do things > Write things

The best way to increase your chances of getting in is to have new and exciting information to share with the school. Those things can include a great final set of grades, so do what you need to do to stay academically focused. In addition, what did you do since submitting your original application that could make your case now even more compelling?

- Is there an activity you've taken more initiative in?
- Is there an interest you've learned more about or dived more deeply into?
- Is there anything you've worked on that could demonstrate any of the <u>5 traits</u> (ex: drive, intellectual curiosity)?

If you're on the school paper, did you get a big story published? If you love tech, did you work toward a free, meaningful certificate, maybe in coding or marketing? So many things could make for strong "continued interest" fodder. Make sure you take a moment to account for everything you've done (or could still do) since submitting - no matter how small or unusual - as it could be just the thing to mention in your letter.

To write strong updates, bear in mind these rules:

- Focus on the impact you had. (How was the activity different than it would have been had you not been there?)
- Quantify your achievement whenever you can.
- Emphasize new traits, skills, or interests you've gained since submitting your original application.

## REVOLUTIONIZING COLLEGE APPLICATIONS: THE ROLE OF AI IN THE ADMISSION JOURNEY

The college application process is a pivotal moment in a student's life, filled with excitement, stress, and anticipation. Over the years, technology has played an increasingly significant role in simplifying and enhancing various aspects of our lives, and education is no exception. Artificial Intelligence (AI) has emerged as a powerful tool, revolutionizing the way students approach the college application process. In this

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For most other letters of continued interest, you should still write up all the impressive updates you can. You'll also want to **add a mini "why us" essay** - a quick love letter to the school. *Side note*: the "Why Us" essay is all about demonstrating your interest in actually attending (ie: your ability to improve the school's yield numbers). **Structure for updates with a mini "why us":** 

#### Your first paragraph should include:

- A statement that you remain interested in the school. **If it's true**: state that the school is your top choice, and you're excited to enroll if admitted.
- [As in the structure above, some variation on this sentence]: Thank you for taking the time to read my letter of continued interest.

In your **second paragraph**, lead with what's most compelling. If you have great updates, put them first. If you don't really have much to say update-wise, go straight into your mini-love letter.

If you didn't already submit a formal Why Us essay, take this opportunity to write a short, informal one. In a nutshell, it involves writing about your ambitions and interests and showing the specific opportunities at the college that match those interests (ex: courses, research opportunities, professors, etc. ...). The reader should be left thinking you will have a worse life outcome if you don't go to their school. Dramatic? Maybe, but getting off the "maybe" list and into the "yes" list is a great time for a little drama.

**Step 3: What is the school asking?** Colleges are very different when it comes to letters of continued interest. It's always a good idea to improve your qualifications (as we described in Step 2 above). But it's a terrible idea to waste time writing an essay the college doesn't want. So make sure you know what's expected.

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Many will examine their lists more closely to reevaluate their thoughts on which schools are "reaches," "targets," and "safeties."

There is a relatively new wrinkle in college admissions is an admissions program called Early Decision II (ED II). Traditional ED programs have a November 1 deadline and a December notification. ED II deadlines are typically in January with notification by mid-February. This extra time allows students who were deferred or rejected from their first choice school to apply with a binding decision, and perhaps a boosted opportunity to another college.

According to my latest research, 75+ colleges and universities offer ED II. <u>Here is</u> a complete list.

## EARLY DECISION II



- ☑ Early decision 2 is binding
- Students can apply to only a single ED 2 college
- ED 2 has a later deadline than ED 1
- Financial aid offers for ED 2 less generous than ED 1



ED II allows students more time to prepare their strongest application. That may mean rewriting their Common Application essay or refining their supplemental prompts or it may mean another chance to take the standardized tests. ED II also gives students with strong performance in their first semester senior year another quarter or semester of grades to share with colleges. According to Sally Rubenstone, Senior Advisor at College Confidential (<a href="https://www.collegeconfidential.com">www.collegeconfidential.com</a>) "Applying Early Decision does give students a bit of an admissions-odds boost at most colleges. Admission folks are usually willing to lock in strong-but-not-spectacular candidates whom they know will show up in September."

Colleges really like Early Decision I and Early Decision II because accepted students are committed to attend, and that increases their yield numbers and the yield number impacts their rankings. Additionally, it helps the admissions office shape the class by allowing them to be pickier with the regular decision applicants. As an example, if a student's big advantage is that they play the oboe and that was a hole the admissions office filled with an ED I or II applicant, it will be more challenging for that student to be accepted in regular decision. Rubenstone also shares that "there can be some financial disadvantages to applying ED in any round because an affirmative decision will eliminate your chance to compare multiple aid packages. But, on the other hand, if an ED school does not offer reasonable aid then it's okay to wheedle out of the so-called "binding" commitment."

## PROCEED WITH CAUTION: RELYING ON CHATGPT FOR COLLEGE ADMISSIONS ESSAYS

While using AI-powered tools such as ChatGPT is undeniably convenient and efficient, using it to craft college admissions essays is extremely risky.

From the hundreds of essays we've read over the past year, the use of ChatGPT is not hard to spot. Most student essays that utilized ChatGPT felt extremely cold, were well above the student's writing level, used words and phrases that teens simply would not use, and never captured a student's character, personality, and unique perspectives.

Here are five specific issues from what we've seen:

- 1. While ChatGPT can generate a coherent, well-structured essay, the program undermines the authenticity and uniqueness needed to write narrative essays. Al, unless you're a robot, typically fails to capture the voice used by teens who write the essays themselves.
- 2. Al-generated content doesn't meet the standard for self-reflection and introspection. Crafting an admissions essay isn't only about presenting polished content, but also about articulating personal growth, as well as real passion and aspiration.
- 3. Al can miss the boat when it comes to contextualizing personal experiences and cultural nuances. This includes communicating a diverse background, experiences, and cultural sensitivities.
- 4. When writing about a college, a student needs to create a story which matches their aspirations. This means being specific about why they want to attend. An essay about the facts of the particular university is not going to work.
- 5. The ChatGPT essays have similar word choice, content and formatting. For our scholarship application this year, we received five student essays that were almost exactly the same!
- While it may be OK to use AI to check grammar, students must invest time and effort in personalizing and refining their essays.

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**Step 4: Look into your odds (optional)** It's not possible to know your odds of getting accepted off the waitlist. It's never possible, actually.

Step 5: Use our simple structure to write a great letter Before you get into an overly literary mode - dreaming up clever metaphors and such for this essay - make sure you know what the college wants to hear. All of these letters should be straightforwardly written. Moreover, some schools explicitly ask for updates only. MIT is an example of a school like that. In that case, your letter should follow this simple structure:



- Dear [admission officer name who wrote to you with your decision],
- Thank you for allowing me to submit these updates on what I've been doing since applying this fall. [Or words to that effect.]
- [List of updates.]
- Thank you again for your consideration.
- [Your name]

If you did submit a formal Why Us essay, here are some informal ways to write your love letter to the school.

- They'll be missing out. Think about what the students at the college will miss out on if you don't go there. Talk about what you'll bring to campus life and why you think you'll be a great classmate and contributor.
- Your unique contributions. Another way to get at the same material is to think about what you'll uniquely bring to this campus. What perspective, ideas, or skills do you have that few others do?
- Love letter. If you're contemplating writing yet another essay, you must be in love with this school. Tell them why. Make a list of all the things you've loved about the college and why they resonated with you.

Connect your updates to your desire to attend that college, if you can. Show a connection between what you do now and where you want to be in a few months.
