







Why Are All Those Teachers Dressing Up Like Mr. Ozdowski?

On Halloween the Faculty and Staff participated in the school's annual Halloween Costume Contest. One of the most creative costumes that day was the collection of faculty and staffers who came dressed as National Football defensive stalwart (and AP calculus teacher) Mike Ozdowski, who played pro ball for the Baltimore Colts. Mr. Ozdowski, of course was selected to be coach of this group of gridiron greats.

The school has been fortunate in having Coach Oz work with Saints Athletic teams over the years. He also previously served as the school's Director of Technology and now is the Chair of the Math Department.

HIGH SCHOOL CAREER

He played high school football for the Parma (Ohio) Senior High School Redmen, earning three varsity letters and All-State honors as a middle guard. He graduated in 1973. Ozdowski was inducted into the Parma Senior High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

COLLEGE CAREER


Ozdowski at 6-5, 240 pounds was a four-year varsity letterman for the Virginia Cavaliers. He earned All-ACC, All-Academic, and Player of the Year honors during his college career. He was named the 1977 University of Virginia Athlete of the Year. Professional career.

Mr. Ozdowski was selected in the second round by the Baltimore Colts with the 53rd pick in the 1977 NFL Draft. As a pro he played in 54 games, starting 29, for the Colts from 1978 to 1981. The 1977 NFL draft had Ricky Bell and Tony Dorsett picked one and two. Coach Oz was picked ahead of NFL veterans Vince Ferragamo, Lester Hayes and icon San Diego kicker Rolf Benirschke.

Coach Oz is the head coach of the St. Augustine High's Fightin' Ozdowski's. His faculty team is undefeated as of press time.





\$1.04 with tax. Interestingly, an auto parts store sold adolescent mystery thrillers.

The only organized sport in town was little league. Besides Boy Scouts, activities for kids were left for the kids to figure out. For young boys, little league might as well have been the major leagues. When I was finally old enough as a nine-year-old, I participated in the draft in hopes one of the teams would pick me.

After the tryouts concluded, the rosters for each team were posted in the afternoon daily newspaper. On that day the draft was posted, I rode my bike home from school as fast as I could, grabbed the paper in the driveway, and headed for the living room couch. Frantically, I turned the pages of the newspaper to where the rosters were printed, only not to find my name anywhere. I was crushed! All I wanted in the entire world was to play baseball at Husted Park on the little league field. With my emotions getting the worst of me, my mother asked me what was wrong. I empathically told her in a burst of tears I was not selected for any of the teams. She grabbed the paper, searched for Eddie Hearn, and sure enough my name was not to be found anywhere.

It was her reaction that I clearly remember. As she held me, she said in a very steady and clear voice that I was a good enough player, but I was shy, and during

the tryouts many of the boys who had been chosen aggressively worked to get the coach's attention. My mother who had watched the tryouts from our car told me that when the coaches were asking for volunteers, not once did I volunteer when the coaches were attempting to organize us for the various drills that made up the tryouts. She told me directly if you want something, you have to seize it. Be noticed! Be confident! Stand up for yourself!

Years later, I was living in Los Angeles, married with children. On a Saturday I was listening to talk radio while washing the family car. Although I have forgotten the specifics, I was listening to an interview of a famous cowboy movie star talking about the moment his career began. As he reminisced, he stated he was in a room with other actors when a director asked, "Can anyone in the room ride a horse?" He immediately stood up and said, "I can." As he recalled, no one else in the room even raised their hand. The director took his name and told him to report to a ranch in the San Fernando Valley the next day. The new cowboy star-to-be left immediately and went to another ranch to learn how to ride a horse.

What happened in the room that day? A group of people were asked whether they possessed a certain skill and everyone in the room except one potential cowboy said,

"Yes!" That potential cowboy did not know how to ride a horse, but he got himself noticed and said to himself, "I have 8 hours to learn how to ride a horse." This simple flip of his thought processes, made a career for him, while others simply never considered the possibility of learning how to ride a horse in one day to see beyond the bigger picture.

These life lessons are many times the difference in great success in one's life. It is interesting how our minds govern the countless opportunities offered to us daily. How many times do we say, "this will never work"? We limit ourselves and our ability in solving problems if we don't look beyond the problem. We talk through the issue with ourselves only to say, "I can't do that." Successful people not only say "yes" far more than "no," but they take risks which sometimes lead to failure.

Some boys sometimes need to be nudged into uncomfortable social situations to gain experience in the world of relationships. They need to discover the possibilities that exist within them. As we attempt to get on the other side of social isolation, this call to action might be needed now more than ever. With the Saints community working in harmony with our parents, our boys can get back on track in their social development and on their way to a happy and faithful life of service.
