Original Copy of "I Have a Dream" Speech Now at Villanova U.

Editor's Note--The following article by reporter Jackie Thomas is reprinted from the "Villanovan," the student newspaper at Villanova University.

On Aug. 27, students, staff alumni and other community members were informed by University President Rev. Peter M.Donohue, O.S.A., Ph.D. of Villanova's new role as permanent steward of the original copy of Dr. Martin Luther King's iconic "I have a dream" speech.

The announcement, released on the eve of the speech's 58th anniversary, described how the document came into the University's possession—through its former steward, George Raveling.

Raveling graduated from the University in 1960 and was a former men's basketball player and assistant coach. He attended the famous March on Washington on Aug. 28, 1963 on a whim, agreeing to volunteer as a member of the security staff the day before the march. In a stroke of luck, fate or coincidence, Raveling found himself face-to-face with King just after he spoke and asked for the copy of his speech. King obliged, and Raveling has been in possession of the speech for the past 58 years.

"At no time do I remember thinking, 'Wow, we got this historic document," Raveling said, recalling the moment in a 2015 interview with Sports Illustrated.

Clearly, however, the speech's historic significance quickly became more apparent as a major call to action during the Civil Rights Movement. Likewise, Raveling held a consequential role as the document's keeper.

According to Donohue's announcement, Raveling, who also served as the commencement speaker for the Class of 2016, has repeatedly articulated his wish to pass stewardship to the University, holding dear the years of instruction, community and Augustinian values instilled in him during his time as a student and coach.

"Thanks to a group of dedicated alumni who were instrumental in ensuring George's wishes were met, and who were committed to fulfilling a shared vision of the landmark speech's importance, Villanova has been entrusted to provide broad access to all those who seek to learn from and be inspired by Dr. King's words," Donohue said.

The University has entered into a collaboration with the Smithsonian and the National Museum of African American History in Washington, D.C. to fulfill the mission of making the document broadly accessible. As part of a long-term loan agreement with the University, the speech will be displayed at the museum as part of the new "Defending Freedom, Defining Freedom" exhibit.

On campus, reactions to the University's new role as the speech's steward ranged from shocked to ecstatic to humbled.

"I'm very surprised, but so happy," sophomore Melanie Gonzalez said. "It's such an honor that we will be able to see and approach something so meaningful."

Sophomore Kaya Robinson too, was initially shocked at the news but sees the honor as progress toward greater diversity and inclusion

REFLECTIONS ON 50 YEARS OF CATHOLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION

On September 7, 1971, I stepped into my first classroom. I had graduated from Loyola University, Los Angeles the previous spring and now as a 20-year-old graduate was facing 18-year-old young men in a government class at Daniel Murphy High School at the cross-section of Wilshire and La Brea in Los Angeles. Previously, it had been Saint John Vianney High School but underwent a name change after a large donation. It was a diocesan all-boys high school operated by the Dominicans. those days the students were grouped according to their grade-point averages. My students were in the "C-D" group. They hated their school and over time had developed bad attitudes towards their ability to learn. As I walked into the class, I felt the eyes of 46 students peering at me. I could not find a smile on anyone's face.

I greeted them, introduced myself, placed my briefcase on my desk, pulled out the class syllabus, and began writing on the blackboard what we were going to study that semester. After the beginning bell rang, I was still writing on the board when a senior, Robert Pistey, blurted out, "So Mr. Hearn, do you really think you are going to teach us." I whirled around and remarked, "that is the plan." It was a rough first day, it was a rougher first year.

When I began teaching, I thought it would only be for a year or two until my wife finished her degree. Given my first-year experience, the difficulty of learning the art of teaching, and my young age led me to question my choice of the teaching profession. However, there was something about the experience I liked—it seemed my students were learning from my instruction even though there were many painful moments.

That same year, I received a phone call from Fr. Patrick Cahalan, SJ who wanted to know whether I would interview at Loyola High School, Los Angeles. He knew me from my time at Loyola Marymount University when I worked for him as a resident advisor in the dorms. This phone call led to a 19-year career at "the Hi" as it was called.



Loyola was founded in 1865 by the Vincentians who ceded the school over to the Jesuits in 1911. It was a place that nurtured my talents, continued to increase my responsibilities and gave me a vision for the future. At one point during my tenure at Loyola, I thought I would be asked to follow Steve Grady, the legendary head football coach at the school when he stepped down.

It was the late Fr. Cahalan who mentored me in the art of leading a catholic school as a president. He invited me to attend his functions and make house calls with him, which opened my eyes to the larger work of the Jesuits.

Fr. Gordon Bennett, SJ who later became a bishop was my principal. As the Assistant Principal for Academic Affairs, he made sure I was growing in my faith, the nature of Jesuit education and my understand of the position of principal. Both became my mentors and friends.

In 1991, Fr. Cahalan came by my office to persuade me to leave Loyola for another school. He told me about a school in Bakersfield, Garces Memorial High School that was in financial trouble and in almost every other facet of school life. It was a co-educational diocesan school that was on the chopping block to close. The school was deeply in debt to the diocese, was in disrepair, and not very catholic. He asked me to take my family and relocate to Bakersfield, give it my best effort for 5 years and if it failed, he assured me there would be a teaching position for me at Loyola. He also said the Jesuits would not have suitable candidates for principals within the next 5 years in the California Province. With my experience at Garces, I would be in line to become one of the first lay principals of one of their schools.

I took the position at Garces. It was the hardest work I have ever experienced. All aspects of the school were in disrepair. I served Garces as the President/Principal, the Admissions Director, and the Director of the Summer Session. It was non-stop work, and the stress was not like anything I had ever experienced. I took two Loyola faculty members with me, and we worked late into the evenings on most nights. We were a team that would not accept defeat.

True to his word, Fr. Cahalan phoned me halfway through my fifth year and offered

Keeping Up with College Application Tasks

COLLEGE COUNSELING NOTES.

During September and October Seniors are working on finalizing their college lists, preparing applications, and putting finishing touches on their essays. Early Action (not binding) and Early Decision (binding) applications are mostly due on November 1 or 15, but some are due as early as October 15 (Texas A&M, Georgia).

COLLEGE DETAILS.

Teacher letters of recommendation for EA or ED should have been requested already, and letters for Regular Decision apps should be requested during October. These requests should be made directly through the SCOIR program. SCOIR is the platform we use to upload and send all recommendations, transcripts, and school reports. Seniors MUST keep their SCOIR college lists updated with the correct due dates or else their documents may not be sent on time. Counselors are currently meeting with all seniors to help with college lists, applications, and getting information needed for evaluation letters.

COLLEGES VISIT CAMPUS.

Also, many college admission reps are visiting Saints during October and early November. Seniors can sign-up for a college visit on the SCOIR home page. These meetings can be important for the college to get to know you and know how interested you are in in them. And finally, remember our advice to arrange just one day each week to speak with your son about his college apps, essays, and scholarship apps. Make the rest of the week a "no college-talk zone" to reduce some of the tension that can boil over during this potentially stressful time. You can set an agenda and everyone can plan to be prepared to talk about progress and what needs to be done going forward. (No ambush nagging!!)

NOW TIPS FOR UNDERCLASSMEN.



2021 Hall of Fame Inductions

After having to forego a Hall of Fame induction ceremony last year due to Covid protocols, Saints is proud to announce that the Hall of Fame is back. Our HOF ceremony will be on Friday, Oct. 8, in the gymnasium at 10:50 a.m. The inductees will also be honored at halftime that night at SD Mesa College as Saints takes on the Madison Warhawks.

Saints is equally proud to announce the inductions of Menelik Holt, a basketball and football star from the class of 2006, and Deacon Richard Hardick, for meritorious service to the school for over 50 years. Congratulations to both Menelik and Deacon Hardick.

Menelik was a 3-year letter winner in both football and basketball, and a 4-year letter winner in track. Menelik helped lead Saints basketball to two league championships in 2005 and 2006, including a 31-1 record and Southern California Regional Championship in 2005, as well as CIF football championships in 2005 and 2006. During the infamous "Miracle Game" vs. Cathedral, Menelik was the receiver who hauled-in the miracle catch in the game's closing seconds.

Menelik caught 119 passes for Saints, good for 1,746 yards and 26 touchdowns.


He also holds Saints' basketball record for 22 rebounds in a game. In football, Menelik was a 3-time all-league player. In 2006, Menelik's football prowess earned him 1st team all-CIF, 1st team all-state, and 1st team all-western region. Following Saints, Menelik continued his football career as a University of Nebraska Cornhusker. Over his 4 years in Nebraska, Menelik was part of the 2006 BIG 12 league championship, the 2009 Gator Bowl championship, and the 2009 Holiday Bowl championship. In his Nebraska career, Menelik played on special teams and caught 49 career passes.

Deacon Richard "Dick" Hardick graduated from Saints in 1957 and never really ventured too far away from the friendly confines of North Park. Deacon Hardick returned to Saints in 1970 and became a math and religion teacher, where he remained for 47 years, and still to this day, Deacon Hardick serves as an Intersession teacher with the popular aquatic sports class, as well as an assistant coach for the Surf Team (which he helped start in the mid-90s). In total, Deacon Hardick's years of service to Saints have now exceeded 51 years. During this span, Deacon Hardick has been a member of both the Board of

Trustees and the Board of Directors. He was instrumental in Saints' construction projects over the past 15 years, serving on multiple building and advisory committees. During his tenure, Deacon Hardick has also served within the Alumni Association, the Hall of Fame Committee, ASB Moderator, and varsity basketball coach from 1971 – 1989, amassing 189 wins.

Always a staunch supporter of Saints Athletics, nowhere was this more evident than in his tenure as the Director of Intramurals. During the late 70s and into the early 80s, Saints' intramural program began to lose some popularity and structure. Deacon Hardick's love of sports led him to volunteer to take over the intramural program in 1985 and return it to its lofty position as a staple of the overall Saints experience.

Please join us in celebrating and congratulating two Saintsmen who represent the very best of what Saints is and does. We are proud to enshrine these two into our Athletic Hall of Fame. Congratulations to Menelik Holt for his athletic accomplishments and to Deacon Richard Hardick for his long-standing and diverse commitment to Saints Athletics.

efforts are made on campus.

"It's nice to have an artifact from the African American community," Robinson explained. "It also seems fitting alongside recent initiatives the school has undertaken in the past few years to promote racial equity."

Terry Nance, associate professor and Chief Diversity Officer for Villanova, expanded on the speech's significance as a symbol of hope and progress.

"This speech is such an important piece of history," Nance asserted. "It's almost like we are now the custodians of 'the dream'."

Nance emphasized, too, that this stewardship role should be anything but passive for members of the Villanova community, referencing the Augustinian values of justice, inclusion and action the institution was founded on.

"Our mission is not an inactive one—it calls us to action and to serve the underserved," Nance said. "Likewise, the speech should be calling us to become a beacon of change. Real change, ideal change, doesn't happen if you don't take time to dream."

The speech, when not on loan to the National Museum of African American History or other like institutions, will permanently reside on campus in a location yet to be determined.





me the principal's position at Brophy College Preparatory in Phoenix. Arizona. As I left Garces, I wondered whether the school would continue its upward trajectory and become sustainable. To my relief, the school has continued to educate young men and women in the region to this day.

Before I left Garces for Brophy, the Jesuit provincial told me "Brophy is like a comfortable country store that has not changed with the times. He instructed me to transform every aspect of the educational program of the school. After I arrived, I found a school immersed in politics that proved challenging the first few years. As the teaching staff was energized, the development of the curriculum and the campus became the overriding priority. New fine arts and math and science facilities were built alongside a new library, sports medicine complex, and a large structure, which accommodated the entire student body.

In my 10th year as principal of Brophy, James Horne, the Saints principal phoned me to see whether I would be interested in the president's position at Saints. It was a rare opportunity to work in a catholic high school that was led by another order of priests. To this point in my career, I was involved with Jesuit education for 29 of my 35 years in catholic education. As my interview unfolded with the Augustinians, I became enamored with the idea of serving the Saints Community that would become my work if they offered me the position. It was an interview that was full of laughter and even some tears. Looking back, it was easily one of the best days of my life. As I was driving down Pershing Drive after the interview concluded, my flip phone rang and it was the late Provincial, Fr. Steve Ochoa, OSA. He told me in very endearing terms that the hiring committee wanted me to serve Saints as president.

My years at Saints have flown by and have been a blessing to me. I am grateful to the Augustinians who took a chance to hire me, the Board of Directors who have helped forge the path, my family who has supported my work, my companions in the mission, the many parents who have become my friends, and the students we serve. The community, blessed by the Holy Spirit, has forged an uncommon path to a rich future for the young boys living in the diocese. To achieve our dream before the Centennial Celebration is a walk in faithfulness by so many in our community and a tribute to the Augustinians and men and women who have come before us.

It is indeed a blessing to be accepted by others. From the moment I stepped on campus on July 5, 2006, until this day, thank you for your acceptance into the finest Catholic community in San Diego.

All Frosh are welcome to apply for 3 Leadership Positions. A minimum 2.0 GPA (not including PE) is required to apply.

- PIT LEADER: The Pit is great because the students are passionate and willing to create organized chaos. Each class has 4 Pit Lieutenants, and Frosh are no different. Mandatory meetings during lunch and after school, and mandatory attendance at all Saints Home Games.
- CLASS OFFICER: The ASB is responsible for planning social events and building better relationships between Saintsmen,
 OLP, and the greater San Diego community. Mandatory 0 block morning meetings and evening social events. 5 Class Officers chosen by lottery.
- FROSH AMBASSADORS: If you're passionate about service and your schedule doesn't allow for morning meetings or evening events then you can join the STAFA. They meet once a week during Lunch and focus on organizing service and charity events that primarily take place during school hours. Unlimited space available.

All accepted applicants for Pit and Class Officer are entered into a Lottery. The Lottery selection process will happen at 7am on November 9th in the Theater, all applicants must be present to accept their position. Failure to attend the Lottery will result in a redraw of the spot. Students may apply for multiple positions but are limited to holding just one. A Pit Leader cannot be a Class Officer or a Frosh Ambassador. This allows for as many students as possible to hold a position. Frosh Class Officer service is not considered toward an ASB Letter, which requires a full year of service, but participation will go on resume and transcript.

Why a Lottery?

The focus for the freshmen year at Saints is on building community and brotherhood. Frosh elections have historically been oppositional and negative, which is in direct conflict with the goals of student leadership. The lottery allows first year students to apply without being forced into an embarrassing public speaking moments or in conflict with a classmate. This process also allows for a wider variety of students to apply and have an opportunity to have their voices heard.
