



From

the start, Saints has prepared us to participate in a changing world through the three core values, Community, Truth, and Love.


Throughout my time at Saints, I heard so much about this word, "brotherhood." Starting here as a freshman, I could give you a definition for this word, but I did not necessarily understand its true meaning. Though, during my time here at this school, I have been able to not only learn about what a brotherhood is, but I was able to be a part of the best one. The brotherhood was more of an action, and less of a simple description. 


new block schedule, classes online, sports delayed, activities Cancelled, and classic Saints events like the Turkey Trot took on a completely new look.

program provides the margin of excellence in our aspirations for the future. Without fund-raising, tuition would have to be even higher and progress would be slowed.

No matter the financial situation at Saints or a current project under construction, there is a healthy tension between the budget and creating more opportunities for our young men. From 2004 to 2018, the goal was the completion of the Master Plan. With that completed, the goal moved to the creation of a more significant endowment to fund the need for financial assistance. While continuing to raise funds for the endowment, Saints will be launching a beautification project in the fall in preparation for the 100-year centennial celebration.

It has been edifying to see the number of Saints benefactors growing. This means Saints unlike many private schools will continue to provide the extra to improve the educational practice of the school. It also means Saints will be in a position to capitalize on new opportunities as they arise.

COVID-19 was a disaster for so many families living in social isolation and in some cases having the disease impact their family with the death of a loved one. In many ways, this disease has changed the way we see the world. Pre-pandemic, most people desired wealth to achieve financial independence and stability. Wealth allowed people to buy whatever they desired, go to expensive restaurants, and travel to faraway exotic places. This notion has been a key driver of the economy generationally.

Since COVID hit last winter, it seems more and more people who define themselves as wealthy have begun to see their wealth more and more as a tool to build a more just community and impact lives outside of their families.

In a recent survey entitled, "The Why of Wealth," it was documented as expected that health concerns surged to the top of the list of worries people were experiencing. Approximately 60% of the respondents concluded that they had reevaluated their perception of wealth. Although there were disparities between Millennials, Generation X and the Silent Generations in how these different generations saw wealth, 78% of Millennials and 73% of Generation X stated there had been a major shift in their giving plans, while only 26% of Baby Boomers felt the same way.

Interestingly, success was viewed by these people as less about capital accumulation and more about the accomplishment of a goal that uses wealth to solve societal issues. For many people, there was a newfound willingness to invest and build greater value in their community rather than just the accumulation of capital.

These newer positions have been readily seen at Saints this past year. When the Saints Community gave \$452,000 last spring to help struggling families keep their sons at Saints, there were many first-time givers in the 352 people contributing. Many of the gifts were \$100 or lower. It was the community helping others. Since the Christmas Appeal, people continue to send unrestricted checks in support of low-income families. Almost every day witnesses a new contribution.

It has been heartwarming to see people helping people. These gifts have been a lifeline to families who have lost a business or a job during the pandemic.

One day last June, a woman phoned me who will remain anonymous. She asked the question, "How many boys will be leaving Saints next year due to unpaid tuition?" I responded, "I did not know, but I would find out." After conferring with Kevin DeRieux, the Executive Director of Finance, I phoned this woman back with a list of names. She asked, "how much money do you need?" and I responded "\$25,000." Without hesitating, she said, "I want to contribute \$50,000 to help these families. Here I am living safely inside the walls of our new home without a worry or concern about COVID-19. The least I can do is help young men achieve an education from Saints. Their education should not be disrupted."

As we continue to educate our young men to be generous to others and use their talents and gifts to contribute to the great issues of our day, we feel and are grateful to you who have heard our call and have responded.



Saints, OLP Take Home a Crown

Schools combine to win first CIF coed tennis in Division I.

Our Lady of Peace, the county's only all-girls school and St. Augustine, an all-boys school, do a lot of things together.

There are dances and shared classes. The OLP Pilots even provide cheerleaders for Saints sports teams.

The schools, however, have never competed with or against each other—until this recent tennis season.

There wasn't enough time for separate boys and girls seasons, Ron Ron Marquez of the CIF San Diego Section pioneered a unique coed tennis season. Wanting to compete, OLP and the Saints teamed up to form a team that was the No. 1 seed in Division I, claiming a championship this Spring with a 9-8 win over No.3 seeded San Dieguito Academy at the Barnes Tennis Center.


With the score 8-8, the match was clinched at No. 5 mixed doubles with OLP/Saints prevailing 7-5.
